#### DID YOU KNOW? - NATIONAL SERVICE MEMORIAL DEDICATION 7-8 SEP 10

Are you a Nasho? We have just dedicated our RAASC Vietnam Plaque, and now the AWM has built a Memorial just for our National Servicemen. Your time has finally come. We have just been told that the Dedication of the National Service Memorial will be held at the AWM in Canberra Tue 7-Wed 8 Sep 2010. See this site for details:

On this site you will find details of the program, and you can download a copy of the form to notify your attendance to the National Service Federation.

No computer? – go to your local internet café, library etc and ask for help to download the information. The program involves:

- a. Tue 7 Sep 10-Reception at Parliament House on the first 1000 National Servicemen/their relatives will get preference to the reception. Details on the form.
- b. Wed 8 Sep 10 0900 form up for parade/dedication ceremony with the Governor General.
- c. Wed 8 Sep 10 1230 on Associations to arrange reunions etc as appropriate.

#### POPPY LAYING CEREMONY PM 8 SEP 10

The AWM have said to us: "It is a suggestion by the Memorial, that if association members wish too, a small poppy laying ceremony can take place over the plaque once installed. Some associations like to move into the tomb of the unknown soldier after the plaque to facilitate a larger laying of poppy's. A separate ceremony at the Tomb could also be facilitated. You would have to look at the numbers, but both are possible."

We have sought and had agreement from the National Service Federation to conduct a poppy laying service. To minimise costs for members it will be held on the afternoon of the dedication, immediately after the dedication.

Lunch will follow at Olims after the ceremony. There are no specific costs like there were for our plaque dedication. Attending? Please let Christina know before 3 Sep 10 at the latest.

This is a wonderful opportunity to view our RAASC Vietnam plaque. The plaque has been laid on the existing walkway, but to the right of the walkway after leaving the carpark for the AWM grounds.

# **VIETNAM VETERANS COMMEMORATIVE WALK - Seymour**

The Vietnam Veterans Commemorative Walk is a project to build in Seymour, Victoria, an area of reflection and commemoration for Vietnam Veterans and their families. It will have over 300 metres of walls with the names of all personnel who served in Vietnam between 1962 and 1975. The stories of Vietnam will be in a replica "Luscombe Bowl" once an entertainment area, now an Interpretive Centre. The Walk will have imitation Rubber Trees and Rice Paddies and military artefacts, we already have a Centurion Tank and are working on obtaining an M113 APC, M2A2 Howitzers, and a "Huey".

We have started on Luscombe Bowl and hope to have it completed by Vietnam Veterans Day 2010. The first tranche of paver sponsorships has closed and we have enough for the forecourt of Luscombe Bowl, but the second tranche is available for the East and West sides of the Bowl.

## ARE YOU A RECIPIENT OF A DFRDB PENSION - then read on...

"DFWA has received formal advice from the Coalition that their recent announcement regarding improved indexation arrangements for DFRDB superannuants over the age of 55 includes DFRB recipients over 55 as well.

DFWA welcomes this clarification and continues to lobby on behalf of MSBS members and the "under 55s".

It is all the more pleasing as there are only approximately 4,000 mainly elderly and widowed DFRB superannuants compared with some 64,000 DFRDB military superannuation pensioners.

DFWA continues to seek discussions with the responsible Government ministers on the issue of military superannuation but the latest is that an announcement will be forthcoming before the coming election.

As of late June it was advised that from the Government's perspective "it was very unlikely that we would get a positive result on the indexation issue" and that they did "not want to raise any false hopes." The Government's announcement will be its response to the Podger Report which as you are aware it has been withholding for quite some time.

The politics of this is interesting! We wait to see what the Government's response will be and what, if any, further movement DFWA are able to coax from the Opposition".

## DO YOU PAY YOUR BILLS WITH A CREDIT CARD ON THE WEB - then read on:

If you visit a website or web page, and look at the address in the web browser, it will likely begin with one of the following: http:// or https

You may not think it is important but the one **without** the S is insecure. You should never enter your credit card number on a site that begins with **http://** 

HTTP stands for Hyper Text Transport Protocol

The S (big surprise) stands for "Secure" and means that the website is talking to your browser using a secure code that no one can eavesdrop on.

On the other hand, a site which begins with http:// means the website is talking in the regular 'unsecured' language. In other words, it is possible for someone to "eavesdrop" on your computer's conversation with the website.

If you fill out a form on the website, someone might see the information you send to that site.

In Summary, If a website ever asks you to enter your credit card information, you should automatically look to see if the web address begins with **https://**.

If it doesn't have an "S", DO NOT PROCEED FURTHER. Pay the account another way.

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## SOME RAASC CORPS HISTORY SNIPPETS

# **EQUAL TO THE TASK - Author Neville Lindsay**

#### THE CORPS FLAG

There are two corps flags on record. The basic design was taken from the RASC flag, being of standard dimensions 5ft by 3ft.



They comprised equal vertical panels in the Corps colours of blue, white and gold with in a centre panel superimposed the Corps officer pattern (that is, multicolour) badge.

That flag was modified in 1960 by superimposition of the RAASC Corps motto Par Oneri, a move by Director V.E. Dowdy to rectify in some degree the reprehensible earlier removal of the Corps motto from the badge itself.

#### The RAASC BADGE

We were a Corps and its derivative is the Latin corpus = a body (here, of men)

The result is that the officer pattern badge was picked because it is prettier, and matches the colours in the flag itself.

## CANNON BALLS!!! DID YOU KNOW THIS?

It was necessary to keep a good supply of cannon balls near the cannon on old war ships. But how to prevent them from rolling about the deck was the problem. The storage method devised was to stack them as a square based pyramid, with one ball on top, resting on four, resting on nine, which rested on sixteen.

Thus, a supply of 30 cannon balls could be stacked in a small area right next to the cannon. There was only one problem -- how to prevent the bottom layer from sliding/rolling from under the others.

The solution was a metal plate with 16 round indentations, called, for reasons unknown, a Monkey. But if this plate were made of iron, the iron balls would quickly rust to it. The solution to the rusting problem was to make them of brass - hence, Brass Monkeys. Few landlubbers realize that brass contracts much more and much faster than iron when chilled. Consequently, when the temperature dropped too far, the brass indentations would shrink so much that the iron cannon balls would come right off the monkey.

Thus, it was quite literally, cold enough to freeze the balls off a brass monkey. And all this time, folks thought that was just a vulgar expression?
